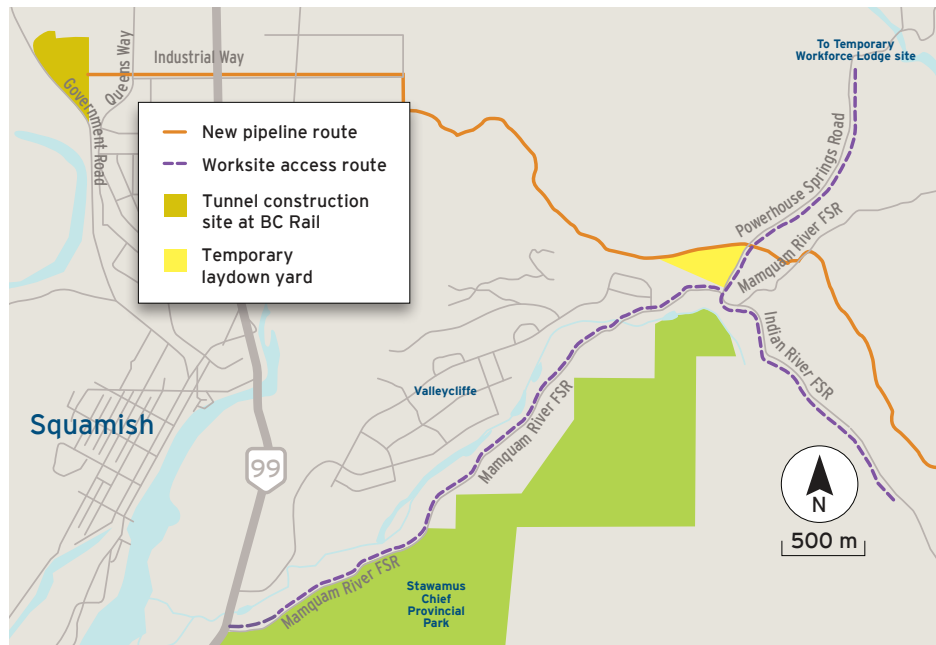


Temporary laydown yard

Listening to community feedback on our Eagle Mountain - Woodfibre Gas Pipeline Project

We've applied for a permit to build a temporary laydown yard on a privately owned, 13.5-acre site near the intersection of Mamquam River Forest Service Road and Powerhouse Springs Road. This location is preferred for a number of reasons including its proximity to Indian River Forest Service Road—the primary access route for pipeline construction. Locating the site office and laydown yard near our worksite access will help minimize disruptions and traffic impacts. We'll continue to work closely with the community to identify and mitigate local disruptions from the site office and laydown yard.



The Indian River Forest Service Road is the only access from Squamish into the Indian River Valley, where most of the project's pipeline construction is taking place. Locating our temporary laydown yard near the Indian River Forest Service Road reduces traffic on local roads and helps minimize disruptions to the community.

Addressing dust

The project's management plans commit FortisBC to dust control in the area. These management plans are regulated by the BC Environmental Assessment Office and the Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation) as part of our project approvals, and finalized versions will be made publicly available on the Environmental Assessment Office's project information centre portal.

Limiting noise and visual impacts

The location's size and shape will allow us to leave a large number of trees along the perimeter as a visual barrier and to help mitigate noise. We're also taking steps to further reduce noise, such as being mindful of back-up alarms and generators in our site design.

Leaving behind a secure site

We know the long-term future of the site is important to those who live nearby. We're in talks with the property owner about how best to leave the site once our work is done. We're committed to ensuring we leave behind a safe and secure site.

Traffic management

For local roads, we're developing plans for traffic management, access and maintenance, including the Mamquam River and Indian River forest service roads. Key mitigation measures are expected to include reducing project traffic by shuttling workers to site, placing traffic control personnel at key locations, additional signage and trailhead parking.

Community engagement

We've been engaging with the community regarding our temporary laydown yard since Spring 2022, including hosting community meetings, listening to feedback and responding to questions.
